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Uganda is a sugar surplus producer, with local consumption currently at about 400,000 tonnes. Over the last 10 years, the industry has been expanding production by nearly 15% per annum on average, culminating into production of 770,000 tonnes of sugar in 2022.

As of 2021, 34 licenses had been issued by the government for sugar production, with the majority concentrated in Busoga region. Most of these mills rely on outgrowers to supply sugarcane, rather than on planted nucleus estates. This has led to instability in the sector, with sugarcane supply and prices swinging wildly from season to season.

Since the beginning of 2023, sugar millers have been operating at half capacity due to lack of sugarcane and prices have shot up to UGX 210,000 per tonne from UGX 90,000. The high cane price influences farmers to plant cane, and two years from now when the crop matures, the market will be flooded, which will drive the cane price down. In the past it has gone as low as UGX 60,000 per tonne.

Farmers will make losses and be discouraged, and many will exit the trade. Eighteen months later, there will be a cane scarcity and the prices will shoot up again. Prospectors and farmers will get excited again and plant plenty of cane... meaningfully to end the cycle.

All countries that produce sugar from sugarcane have some form of legislation to support the productivity and competitiveness of the sector while at the same time protecting sugarcane farmers and millers. After years of lobbying for legislation of the industry, Uganda finally released a Sugar Policy in 2010, which gave birth to the Sugar Act 2020 – a full decade later. However, the Act is still yet to be operationalised. As a result, consumers, farmers, millers and the economy are being adversely affected.

is passed along to consumers. Since mid-last year, Ugandans have experienced a steady rise in sugar prices, which fluctuated from UGX 3,500 per kilo to seasonal highs of UGX 10,000. Now the price is hovering in the area of UGX 6,000.

The farmers cannot thrive in a wildly fluctuating environment, and the uncertainty has caused many to abandon their cane investment even before they reap the benefits of ration harvests. They sometimes fall victim to unscrupulous millers with compromised weighbridges. They are also driven to harvest immature cane, which affects yield and further reduces their earnings.

For millers, the single largest variable in the production cost is the sugarcane, which accounts for a big portion of the total cost of production. It is also costly to have mills operating on and off or at greatly reduced capacities. This has a knockon effect on economies of scale and factory wear and tear. Furthermore, the harvesting of immature cane affects the amount of sugar a miller can get from the same tonnage, with recovery dropping from 8% to 6%.

At the macro level, Uganda is losing income from sugar exports that have dropped from 175,000 tonnes to now zero

In the absence of an authoritative external influence, this will continue to be the trend for the foreseeable future, which does not bode well for the sugar industry. Sugar legislation recommended, among other measures, the constitution of a and so on and so forth. Unless the government intervenes Sugar Board to oversee the sector and handle issues of cane pricing, ratify agreements between millers and outgrower farmers, and general issues like sugar quality, safety and health standards.

> This has yet to be done, while the Trade Ministry continues to license mills in the name of promoting investment, and the Agriculture Ministry has failed to take outgrower farmers under its wing. It should be noted that Uganda's climate can support cane growing all over the country; there is no reason new mills should go to Buganda and Busoga regions to access cane without supporting agriculture.

When the cost of producing sugar goes up, the increment Moving forward, there is an urgent need to ensure more balanced, factual information and data collection on the sugar industry; operationalisation of the Sugar Act as a matter of priority; and no politicisation of sugar for personal gain by local leaders and other stakeholders.



AfCFTA Secretary General hails KSL products as world class



H. E. Mene was on a tour of Uganda to promote intra-African trade in the private sector, and thereby feed into the vision of the AfCFTA. He was hosted at Kakira by General Manager Christian Vincke, Executive Director Mwine Jim Kabeho and Director Finance Satish Sawhney.

The African Continental Free Trade Area is going to be the world's largest free trade area, bringing together the 55 countries of the African Union currently under eight Regional Economic Communities. The mandate of the AfCFTA is to create a single continental market, and as of May 2022, 54 countries had signed. The AfCFTA Secretariat is hosted in Accra, Ghana.

Mr. Kabeho, who is concurrently the Chairman of the East African Sugar Industry Association and board member to the East African Business Council last month attended an AfCFTA summit, representing East Africa. Delegates met in Cape Town, South Africa, to discuss fast tracking the integration of Africa's regional trade agreements.

"The goal is to progressively eliminate tariffs and non-tariff barriers to intra-Africa trade, so that African businesses can benefit from the growing African market," Kabeho says. "We have to increase Intra-Africa Trade which currently is at only 16%."



With the integration of the African continent, Uganda stands to benefit from expanded trade, to increase production capacity and create employment. Initial target areas are Dairy and Beef, Coffee, Sugar, Tea, Iron and Steel, among others. Services will include Education, Tourism and Infrastructure services. "The key focus markets are West Africa in particular Nigeria, Ghana and Cameroon. In North Africa we are targeting Morocco, Algeria and Tunisia," Kabeho says.

After the factory tour, the Uganda team and AfCFTA delegation was hosted to lunch at Jinja Sailing Club. In his closing remarks, H. E. Mene said what he had seen in Uganda provided solid evidence of Africa's ability to be self-sufficient. With guided trade initiatives to encourage cross-regional exports, there would be no need to have basic commodities such as sugar, cloth, milk or medicines imported from outside the continent.

Dr Adriko was the founding Dean of the Faculty of Engineering at Makerere University in 1970, and has since served Uganda in different capacities. He was on the commission that drafted the 1995 constitution, and joined politics as the representative of Vurra County in Arua District.

Later, he was appointed Minister for Industry and Technology and held different ministerial posts. He rose to the position of Second Deputy Prime Minister. In 1996, he resigned from active elective politics.

After leaving active politics, he was appointed Chairman Board of Directors at Uganda Revenue Authority from 1997 until 2004. Following that, he was appointed Chancellor of Kyambogo University and later, Muni University.

The Joint Managing Directors appreciated Adriko for his contribution to Kakira, particularly to the growth of the Kakira






Outgrowers Development Fund (KORD), of which he was the founding Chairman.

Makepasi breaks production and employment records

Makepasi Match Ltd has achieved another milestone in November 2022 – a new highest production of 61,240 cartons (61,240,000 individual Match boxes). This is significant not only in the history of Makepasi Match Ltd but is the highest ever recorded monthly production for any single wax match factory globally from one premises in one month.

Management worked out plans to increase volume with additional infrastructure including the building of a new factory – Unit III – which was inaugurated in May 2021. This was rapidly followed by the addition of more machinery. The unit then commenced production successfully which in turn created employment opportunities for a further 100 Ugandans, some of whom are People with Disabilities. Makepasi Match Ltd is now the largest employer of People with Disabilities in Uganda.

Since the commissioning of Unit III the factory team has been focused on achieving a target of 60,000 Cartons per month and finally this milestone was reached during the Month of November 2022. This represents a significant step forward for the entire match industry in East Africa as not only are we now able to easily supply 100% of the demand in Uganda, but also export to neighbouring countries in Africa and beyond.

In line with the Makepasi policy of donating wheelchairs Makepasi Match and Mr Pratap Madhvani and family to people with disabilities five additional wheelchairs were donated on Thursday 6th April 2023 to the following recipients from Makepasi Match (two wheelchairs) and Mr

KSL pilots seed cane varieties and outgrowers sensitisation



The Kakira Sugar Limited Outgrowers Section is providing good quality seed cane to registered farmers. According to Outgrowers Manager Kokasi Wambete, the goal of the project is two-fold.

"We are replacing ration seed cane with high quality seed, while boosting farmer yields, which will ultimately feed into our factory high recovery figures," he explained.

A service centre has been set up where Kakira registered farmers can process seed-cane sales. The CO421 seed cane is popular among the outgrower farmers, who perceive it to be a hardy variety, which grows easily in the area.

To date 4,500 tonnes of seed cane have been disbursed to Kakira outgrower farmers.

In tandem with the seed cane initiative is a project to provide low-cost fertiliser to Kakira registered farmers at highly subsidised prices. KSL has partnered with Grain Pulse Limited, who deal in fertiliser blends. Under this initiative, farmers can access affordable fertiliser on site at Kakira and purchase it against their expected bonuses from KSL if need be.

Farmer sensitisation

Effective and continuous communication has long been essential in maintaining a good relationship with the outgrower farmers. To that end, the Kakira Sugar Limited Outgrowers Section conducts regular sensitisation exercises to engage the farmers on a range of issues.

Farmer outreach is done across Busoga in the farmer area, in partnership with the Busoga Sugarcane Growers Association (BSGA), currently chaired by David Ojwang. The BSGA is



an independent umbrella organisation bringing together outgrower farmers over issues of work and welfare.

Farmer sensitisation covers such topics as:

- Understanding the KSL cane payment system
- How to compute back pay Bonus.
- Cane planting and sugarcane agronomic practices
- Clean cane harvesting demonstrations
- Farmer vehicle registration

Furthermore, KSL and BSGA have partnered with Centenary Bank, Tropical Bank and Stanbic Bank, who all provide special cane-growing loan facilities to registered farmers. These loans are offered at 15% - 25 % per annum – well below prevailing

The Kakira Sugar Outgrower scheme has always been at the forefront of empowering farmers, enabling them to get the best out of their cane fields and ensuring timely payments at competitive prices throughout each growing season. "We encourage all our registered farmers to take advantage of the support offered, and thank them for their loyalty," Wambete concludes.




Since the revival of the Muljibhai Madhvani & Company Limited Steel Division, it has grown steadily into a market player to be reckoned with.

According to General Manager Kanaka Raju, the company has achieved some major strategic milestones in ensuring quality and continuity. The ISO-certified company also had its quality control laboratory certified by the Uganda National Bureau of Standards.

Madhvani Steel recently introduced TMX (QST) German patented Technology. TMX (QST) rebar is a high-quality steel bar with a definite advantage over TMT Bars with superior properties such as high elongation, weldability, ductility and Tensile Strength. TMX bars are new generation bars which are of high strength steel and are proven to be more heat and earthquake resistant. This will definitely add strength and safety to any structure.

The company is also investing USD 500,000 in replacing the reheating furnace, which will reduce HFO consumptions and reduces conversion costs.



"These developments ensure unmatched quality production that places us in a strong position in the market," Raju explains.

The plant only uses imported billets in the production process, which further ensures a quality and reliable product.

Madhvani Steel Division has also posted record sales volumes in 2022, supplying metal bars to both government and high-value private projects alike. For instance, Uganda National Roads Authority projects, the Karuma hydro-power project, the Kampala fly-over construction and the Kampala Marriot Hotel.

Currently, Madhvani Steel plant manufactures 8mm, 10mm, 12mm, 16mm, 25mm and 32mm steel bars for construction. The company is investing in new colour roll forming profiles by next year, while revamping the SMS and wirerod mill are in the pipeline.

Revisiting Kakira after 50 years

When Malkit Rooprai first visited Kakira Sugar, it was as a seven-year-old boy in the 1960s. "My family was visiting from Thika to attend a wedding in Jinja, and one of our hosts, who worked in Kakira, brought me to tour the factory," he explains.

This visit, however, is part of a seven-month drive from his current home in the UK, through 30-plus African countries. Rooprai, a 63-year-old Kenyan-born British data migration consultant, embarked on this overland adventure partly to show the world just how safe and hospitable Africa truly is. His work brought him to Africa often, but always by air, and he longed to fully experience the locations at his own pace.

And so on October 6, 2022, he loaded up his Toyota Land Cruiser and set off. He has since driven down the west coast of Africa, to the southernmost tip, and back up through the east coast, entering East Africa through Tanzania.

On May 3, 2022, Rooprai was on his way to an overnight stop in Mbale to see Sipi Falls and then proceed to Kenya when he saw the Kakira Sugar signpost and recalled his childhood visit. "I decided to turn off the highway and see the factory once more - the growth is remarkable!"

He was welcomed to the complex by Joint Managing Director Mayur Madhvani and Company Secretary S. K. Iyengar. After a factory tour, he shared tales of his travels with senior members of the Sikh community in Jinja.

He set himself a personal goal of driving 350km a day, and usually looks for a place to spend the night around 5:00pm each day, before it gets dark. As a member of the Sikh

community, Rooprai sometimes enjoyed the hospitality of local prayer halls known as Gurdwaras.

"Africans have been truly hospitable. I have slept in many homesteads, and I am often given something to eat or some hot water for a shower the next morning," Rooprai shares.

Although he is travelling alone, his trip has been safe and without incident. As a rule, he does not offer anyone a lift, and his car is fitted with a tracker and an SOS button, as extra safety measures. However, his top tip to any traveller is to have a good attitude.

"I have found that in dealing with security checks, border crossings or the natives, just remember to speak politely and be humble," Rooprai advises.

His most memorable moments of Uganda have been gorilla tracking and, of course, visiting Kakira once again, where he spent the night at Kakira Guesthouse before proceeding to Kenya. Due to the instability in Sudan, Rooprai will have to review his options for returning to the UK via the east coast. We wish him a safe conclusion to his trans-African trip. Each room features a bath and shower combo, all warmed by an eco-fireplace with spectacular views over the Bwindi Forest, and an enchanting indoor forest.


A heated plunge pool on the balcony will provide a relaxing experience after the demands of the day's excursions.


Silverback Lodge thanks its guests for their patience during this period, with a promise that the re-imagined sanctuary will be worth the wait.











As Paraa Safari Lodge undergoes significant renovations, additional government-funded projects have surfaced that promise to directly benefit the establishment.

The newly constructed road from Masindi to Paraa Safari Lodge has notably enhanced accessibility, while the construction of a bridge over the Nile River has considerably eased guest travel from the southern bank.

The Paraa Bridge, which will have a lifespan of 120 years, measures 525 metres long. It is a safe, convenient and welcome alternative to the previous arduous journey via ferry. Prior to the opening of the bridge, travellers and visitors inside the park would have to rush not to miss the 6:00pm daily deadline for using the ferry.

The journey from Masindi town to Paraa by road used to take up to five hours. With the road works and Paraa bridge, this has now been reduced to approximately one and half hours.

The finished sections of the road now boast of smooth and neatly flattened tarmac; and many stretches have been flattened and packed with murram and gravel. This has greatly eased navigation through the Murchison Falls National Park and to the viewing points at the top of Murchison Falls itself.

Regarding the government-funded projects in the park, it is also worth mentioning the installation of hydroelectric power. Such projects are expected to elevate the status of the lodge and make a notable contribution to an upsurge in business.

Don't be afraid to ask for help






You must love your job










Chobe hosts Presidential CEO forum, revamps luxury tents

Aberdare Country Club lends a hand





KSBF skilling vocational learners for employment

In 2018, Kakira Sugar Limited established the Kakira Sugar Busoga Foundation. The UGX 400 million scholarship fund is aimed at specifically sponsoring students in vocational training to address the high levels of unemployment in the region.

Thirty percent of the scholarship is distributed to biological dependents of KSL employees, 30% to dependants of registered KSL outgrower farmers and the balance (40%) to students within the Busoga sub-region.

A nine-member board of the scholarship foundation was appointed to oversee the scholarship, chaired by Victoria Sekitoleko, the former Minister for Agriculture. Kakira contributes UGX 200 million to the scheme each year.

KSL Company Secretary, S. K. lyengar explains that at its core, the scholarship scheme seeks to sponsor students in vocational skills to address the high levels of unemployment in the region. It requires a mindset shift to stop viewing vocational schools as a place to dump slow learners, but as an opportunity to impart skills that make youths immediately employable and also able to create employment.

Students are sponsored to pursue certificates in agriculture, civil engineering, electrical engineering, automotive, instrumentation, mechanical, nursing, midwifery, plumbing, tourism, hospitality and laboratory technology – all offered by a list of accredited institutions around Busoga.

Since its inception, the scholarship has reached over 300 young people in Busoga region, equipping them to join the labour market.

In 2019, I was working as a casual labourer in Kakira, trying to raise money for further studies. A friend who knew about my dream came and told me about the KSBF scholarship. It was an opportunity at exactly the right time and I am glad I took it. Since I graduated I have been employed in one company, and now I also do contract electrical work for myself.

The Madhvani scholarship gave me hope...

My name is Naigaga Shanitah and I am 25 years old. I was born in Mayuge District. I am a Musoga, and the second born of three children. I love sports and I play volleyball.

My education path has not been smooth. By the time I was at mid-primary level, things began to get difficult. My father abandoned us for another family, leaving my mother as sole caretaker. She worked very hard to make sure my brother and I had what we needed to survive and to go to school.

When I joined secondary school at Iganga, the costs of school fees and requirements increased and it was hard for her to provide all the necessities. I decided to join the school volleyball team, and due to my good performance, I was given a half bursary up to Senior 4. When I came back for my A Levels, I was given a full bursary. This was a very big relief for mum. My father started to provide school fees for my brother, and once in a while contributed for me since he knew that I was on a bursary.

However, he fell sick in 2013, and by 2015 when I started Senior 5, he was very weak. He was suffering from diabetes, kidney failure and high blood pressure. After my Senior 6 in 2017, my mum opened up a bar at home and she told me to manage it and also take care of my little sister. By then my brother was at university at Makerere. This bar was the source of income where we could get food and some money to send to my brother and also pay hospital bills for my dad.

Mum left us and went to take care of dad since no one was there for him by then. Managing the bar was the most challenging experience I have ever had.

When my brother graduated, I also enrolled at Kyambogo University to do a BSc. In Technology (Chemistry). I was hopeful and excited. I remember I joined on 4th of August, 2018, and my father died on 21st August, 2018. I felt so sad, because I had lost my dad and also lost my hope of further education. 2018 was a very trying time for the family, because we lost four loved ones in that year.

I thought that was my end, and I started applying to different scholarship organizations but all in vain. I turned to my love of sports, and joined a volleyball club known as Nemostars. This provided me with some supplementary money for upkeep, but it was still a struggle to get all my needs.

One day my OB told me about Madhvani scholarships and he told me to give it a try. I prayed to God and told Him, "This is my last hope. I really need it, please help me God."

I applied and got shortlisted for the interviews. You cannot imagine my joy when I discovered I had been awarded the scholarship! This has been a great stepping stone in my life, I felt really happy, and my hope was restored until I achieved

I want to say thank you to the Madhvani Foundation for playing a very big part towards my success. I am really grateful. You restore hope to those that had lost it. May the Almighty God bless you.

About 70 km outside Kampala, is Mwera Tea Estate and factory, which sits on 650 hectares of farmland, natural forest and wetlands. Mwera is the primary plantation for Muljibhai Madhvani and Co. Tea Division, with a similar plantation situated at Nakigalala in Kajjansi, Wakiso District, having 188 hectares under tea.

The Mwera and Nakigalala tea estates together have a production capacity of 1.3 million kg of tea, annually. Mwera Tea Estate also purchases green leaf from outgrowers from the surrounding area and produces 0.35 million kg, annually.

Mwera is run by a management team under General Manager Sandeep Kumar Bhuyan, while the in-charge at Nakigalala Estate is Uttam Sahu.

The Mwera tea factory is UNBS and ISO 9001:2015 certified. There are 125 staff with about 80 skilled workers, working in the plantation and the factory. A clinic equipped with an ambulance and run by two nurses addresses any immediate healthcare concerns. Kalpana Pratap Madhvani Primary School in the estate, serves about 175 students across primary one to seven. There is also a worker's club, which offers recreational space and facilities.

From Tea Leaf to Tea Cup

Tea grows well in sandy loamy soil having a PH level in between 4.5 to 5.5. Mwera soil condition is ideal for tea plantation and the tea is growing well. All the agricultural practices are followed in the Estate from pruning, tipping, weed control and fertilizer application, up to plucking of tea leaves. Soft tea leaves are plucked and taken to the factory for processing. "Skilled pluckers know how to pluck two leaves and a bud," Sandeep explains.

After harvesting, the tea must go straight to the factory for processing. Good manufacturing practices are followed to produce the best quality of CTC Tea.

Green leaves are stored in withering troughs for 16 hours to bring down the moisture content to 70%. After that, the withered leaf is processed in the Rotorvane/CTC machine for mincing the leaf to make granules and dust. The cut leaf then passes through a Continuous Fermenting Machine where the teas are fermented to the desired level.

Finally, the fermented leaf is dried and sorted. Mwera produces around 70% of primary teas consisting grades like BP1, PF1, PD, DUST1 and 30% secondary teas consisting of grades BP, PF, FNGS, DUST, BMF.

Teas are tasted and valued, before being packed in paper sacks and poly sacks. These teas are then exported to the Mombasa Auction for sale.

Estate expansion efforts

According to Sandeep, several developments have been made to improve the efficiency of the factory, including:

- -Installation of new Rotorvane and CTC machines
- -Decommissioning of the old heater
- -Installation of a new two-tonne boiler to aid withering process and provide heat for the dryer

There has also been expansion of the estate, with a tea nursery project of about 400,000 seedlings of different quality and quantity clones. When they have been planted, these seedlings will create an additional area of 30 hectares of tea plantation.

Mwera is also planting Eucalyptus trees every year to meet the factory firewood requirement. The natural forests crossing the estate are also maintained by the management, to create an eco-friendly condition in and around the Estate. Mwera has plans to plant 100 hectares of tea and 100 hectares of Eucalyptus, which project will be completed in a span of four years.



KORD partners with Howard University on research



KORD believes in community participatory based research that makes important contributions towards understanding community dynamics and how best community challenges can be addressed utilizing well informed strategies.

To that end, KORD has partnered with the Howard University Department of African Studies (Washington D.C.) and Busede Subcounty (Jinja District) to carry out an assessment of the emergency response to the impact of COVID-19 on the education sector in rural Uganda. Howard University is a private, historically black research university in Washington, D.C.

While the full scale of the impact of COVID-19 may not be known until much later, current evidence suggests that COVID-19 has exposed and exacerbated vulnerability of the emergency response for education in Uganda. COVID-19 emergency response efforts resulted in national school closures that lasted from March 2020 until January of 2022.

Uganda had the longest COVID-19 school closures in the world. The focus of this research was on the impacts of COVID-19 pandemic on the education sector and emergency responses during school closures using Busede Subcounty as a case study.

The overall objective of the study was to identify impacts of COVID-19 on the education system in rural Uganda, looking out for opportunities to diffuse e-learning during pandemics with stakeholders highlighting or recommending strategies for education continuity amidst pandemics.

Respondents highlighted the need to change the education system, build capacity of educators and students to utilize online tools and technology for learning and empower local leaders to always involve community when planning for new policies and initiatives affecting the community.


